April Is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. It is a time which we highlight the importance of families and communities working together to prevent child abuse and neglect. The Federal Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act defined child abuse and neglect as, at a minimum, "any recent act or failure to act on the part of a parent or caretaker which results in death, serious physical or emotional harm, sexual abuse or exploitation, or an act or failure to act which presents an imminent risk of serious harm"

Child abuse isn't just about bruises. While physical abuse is shocking due to the marks it leaves, not all signs of child abuse are as obvious. Ignoring a child's needs, putting them in unsupervised, dangerous situations, exposing them to sexual situations, or making them feel worthless or stupid are also forms of child abuse and neglect—and they can leave deep, lasting scars on the next generation.

If you suspect a child is suffering from abuse or neglect, it's so important to speak out. By catching the problem early, both the child and the abuser can get the help they need.

Help and additional information is available at my office at the Joyful Noise Learning Center and at Pilgrim Church.

The first week of April we'll highlight this recognition amongst our staff and parents with special t-shirts, flyers and pinwheels!

April also brings Easter parties and special lessons on just what Easter is really all about: Jesus loves you!

Council Highlights from the Moderator

Things are still moving along with the restoration process, though it may not look like it. Work is set to begin in early April! (Our patience will be rewarded once we are back at home. Safe, snug, and DRY.)

We have had door to door driving service over at Kings Gate for our Sunday Worship Service. You can now hop on a golf cart from your car to the front of the lobby for service. This curtesy is provided by our volunteers, Dean Fritz & Sandee Ewing. (Thank you!)

Relighting Pilgrim will be an expensive project to fund as we move forward with our restoration. We will more than likely complete this in stages. Our Properties and Grounds Committee have started the first stage of the project by walking the property and repairing/salvaging what they can and planning out what is still needed with the costs associated. They are continuing their research by bringing consulting with lighting experts and electricians to ensure our wiring is efficient.

Joyful Noise has cancelled its summer camp program this year. We cannot ensure that the Community Center would be ready in time. A delay of this decision would leave a very short time frame for parents to find childcare if ours could not open.

After a meeting with our Insurance Liaison, we have learned that our insurance premiums and deductibles will increase with our next policy. We will start building back our reserves for this and discuss further fundraising options as restoration continues.

Finance Committee will continue to tweak our budget this next month for the new quarter, including the summer program cancellation. Discussions continue looking at different avenues of bringing in revenue – via fundraisers, craft shows, yard sales, etc. – but everything is on hold until we have restored buildings.

We continue to follow safety protocols during our reconstruction. Please do NOT enter any of the construction areas unless you have prior authorization. Your safety and our workers' safety are very important. (Thank you.)

Several congregation members have come to different Council members, including myself recently. They have brought items of questions and concerns. We are always happy to answer any questions, or get an answer to you (via e-mail or phone call). If it needs more research, we will add it to our agenda for the next Council meeting for further discussion.

If you have ever wondered what goes on at a Council meeting, come check one out! They are always open to attend. Your voice matters to Council and myself. These meetings are a great way to be part of the ministry that is happening at Pilgrim Church.


Introduction to Worship: why we Do what we Do

The Lectionary, Liturgy and the Christian Calendar

The lectionary is a pre-selected collection of scriptural readings from year in a 3-year cycle that includes a reading from the Old Testament, a Psalm, a reading from the Epistles, and a Gospel reading. The Old Testament Readings are on a rotation of the story of the Patriarchs and the Exodus in Year A, the monarchial narratives in Year B, and readings from the Prophets in Year C. The gospel reading rotation is from one of the synoptic gospels: Year A: the Bible designed to be used for worship and study. The liturgical Matthew, Year B: Mark, Year C: Luke.

Liturgical Seasons and Colors

Epiphany is also known as Three Kings' Day, 12 days after is usually Christmas. In most Protestant churches, Epiphany celebrated on the Sunday closest to January 6. Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday.

records the death and resurrection of Jesus occurring around the time of the Jewish Passover. Passover continues to be celebrated on the first full moon following the vernal equinox, when the Sun crosses the equator going north. In 325 CE, the Council of Nicaea Easter Sunday is the holiest day on the Christian calendar. Scripture established that Easter would be held on the first Sunday after Passover. For this reason, Easter can fall from March 22 through April 25. Pentecost Sunday is a commemoration and celebration of the official birthday of the Christian church, marked by the receiving of the Holy Spirit by the early believers (Acts 2:1-4). Pentecost Sunday s observed on the seventh Sunday after Easter.

Order of Worship

"O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! O come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord, our Maker!"

Psalm 95:1-2, 6



Worship is at the center of Christian life. It is a time when we gather to honor, praise, and thank God. During a typical worship service, there is time for reflection and repentance, praise, and thanksgiving. There is also time included for silence and listening, as we engage the scriptures to hear God's still-speaking voice. Our worship service can be broken down into four sections: praise and worship, thanksgiving, listening, and sending. Sometimes there is a fifth section: communion. What follows is an outline and description of our Order of Worship.



Section 1: Worship

Prelude

The Prelude marks the beginning of worship. It is a time of spiritual preparation. Instrumental music during this time is meditative, encouraging worshipers to pray silently in order to focus on and open their hearts to God, who is present through the Holy Spirit.

Call to Worship

The Call to Worship is a spoken invitation to worship, and serves to remind us of our charge to worship God and God alone. It is often a responsive reading, allowing the congregation to respond and acknowledge their call to and participation in worship.

Opening Prayer or Invocation

The Opening Prayer is also known as an invocation. It is a prayer through which God's Spirit is formally invited to be present and to let its presence be known during our time of worship. We ask that the Holy Spirit bless our sacred time of worship and guide us to ensure that our worship remains God-focused and pleasing to God. The opening prayer may also serve as a prayer of confession as we prepare to enter worship with pure intentions and a clean heart.

Opening Hymn

The Opening Hymn is one of praise and celebration. Usually, this hymn is energetic, with its focus being on acknowledging and proclaiming the glory of God. The congregation joins together in singing as one voice, one body.

Section 2: Thanksgiving

Blessing of Tithes and Gifts

During this time our tithes and gifts are brought before the Lord. Scripture calls us to give back a portion of what God has given us, reminding us that everything belongs to God. In the same vein, our tithes are tokens of our gratitude for God's blessings. Tithing also constitutes participation in the ministry of the gospel; all tithes and gifts go to support the ministry of Christ's church.

Section 3: Listening

Scripture Readings

During this part of worship, scriptures from the Old Testament, Gospels, and Epistles/ New Testament (letters and the book of Revelation) are read. Through these sacred stories and teachings, God continues to reveal Himself and to teach us. Therefore, we are to listen intently as the scripture is read to hear God's still-speaking voice.

Choir Anthem

The anthem is a song of worship, praise, or reflection that is inspired by scripture. Its purpose is to enhance our understanding of the day's scriptures, especially the scripture on which the pastor will preach.

Statement of Faith

The purpose of the Statement of Faith is not to exclude and isolate true believers, but rather to provide a common ground of truth which serves as the basis of communal worship, fellowship and service to Christ as one spiritual body and family in the local church. Also, it serves as a public declaration of faith for individual worshipers and for the community of faith.

Hymn

Like all hymns, this one is a song of praise. However, this particular hymn, which follows the scripture readings, usually ties in with the scripture on which the pastor will preach to help reiterate the message of the sermon.

Sermon

This is the Pastor's message for the week. The goal of the sermon is to connect the message from scripture with our lives today in meaningful ways. Sermons are not taken lightly. There is much prayer and study that goes into preparing the message. The pastor delivers the sermon with humility, trusting that the Holy Spirit's voice will speak through his/her words.

Moment of Reflection

This time allows us to prayerfully reflect on the words spoken in the sermon before the worship proceeds.

Prayers of the People and The Lord's Prayer

The prayers of the people is when we join together to pray for each other, our neighbors, and others around the world. The pastor begins the prayer and then holds a moment of silence so that we may lift up silent prayers, praying for those on our prayer list and those we carry with us in our hearts. The pastor then concludes the prayer, asking the congregation to join in on reciting The Lord's Prayer at the very end.

Section 4: Communion

Communion

This sacrament is observed on the first Sunday of every month and on special occasions. Communion is open, all are welcome to Christ's table. However, it is not mandatory to partake.

Communion is a shared meal that Christ's commands us to observe. We share the cup and the bread as a reminder of the new covenant made through the body and blood of Jesus Christ, given to us for the forgiveness of sin. We find the recollection of Jesus' last meal and his command to observe it "in remembrance of me" recorded in all four Gospels.

Section 5: Sending

Closing Hymn

The closing hymn is traditionally one of commissioning. It reminds us of our call to be disciples - to go and proclaim the gospel through our words and actions. This hymn may also reiterate the message of the scripture and sermon.

Benediction

A benediction is a blessing. On behalf of God, the pastor blesses the people in accordance to God's promises found in scripture. Having engaged with God through worship, we leave knowing we are deeply loved by God!

Postlude

The postlude is instrumental music played while you leave the worship space. It is usually upbeat and celebratory. While it is being played, the Pastor is at the door of the worship space to greeting folks as they leave to serve the Lord.

The Sacraments

The Preamble to the Constitution of the United Church of Christ: "In accordance with the teaching of our Lord and the practice prevailing among evangelical Christians, the United Church of Christ recognizes two sacraments: Baptism and the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion."

Sacraments are ritual actions in worship which were instituted by Jesus and recorded in scripture. In the sacraments of baptism and communion we ask the Holy Spirit to use water, bread, and wine to make visible the grace, forgiveness, and presence of God in Christ.



The sacrament of baptism has been said to be "a visual representation of an inner event." It signifies one's faith in Jesus as the crucified and risen savior. Through baptism, one communicates their acknowledgment that they have been buried and resurrected with Christ, putting to death their old self to walk with Christ in newness of life (Romans 6:3-4). In other words, one's baptism symbolizes the gift of new life in Christ and acceptance of that gift.

Baptism also symbolizes a believer's incorporation into Christ's church. It demonstrates one's desire to learn and grow as a disciple of Christ and to be in communion with other brothers and sisters in Christ. It conveys a commitment to share one's gifts and talents with the Body of Christ in order to proclaim the gospel and serve others in Christ's name.

As the United Church of Christ's Common Book of Worship states, "Through baptism, Christians are brought into union with Christ, with each other and with the church of every time and place."

SOW WE SO SO

The sacrament of Communion is full of meaning and symbolism. In breaking the bread and pouring the cup, we first and foremost remember the crucifixion of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It is through Jesus's sacrifice that we have been reconciled to God and welcomed into relationship with God. During the recognition of Holy Communion, a believer is to reflect on their propensity to sin and God's unmerited, overwhelming grace. Communion also encourages one to respond to God's sacrificial love by picking up their own cross and following Christ in humble service (Matthew 16:24), loving others as Christ has loved us.

Moreover, this sacrament is a communal event. We come to Christ's table together. By sharing the bread and the cup, participants are reminded of their belonging to the body of Christ. We are then challenged to reflect upon Jesus' prayer for His disciples to be one (John 17:21), as Christ is one with God and the Holy Spirit, to work together towards building Christ's kingdom here and now.

Communion at Pilgrim Church is celebrated on the first Sunday of each month and on special liturgical calendar dates.

The invitation to receive Communion is extended to all seeking God's grace to proceed to Christ's table. We serve communion by intinction. This is the practice of partly dipping the consecrated bread, into the consecrated grape juice. We use grape juice, instead of wine, so all may partake. Prefilled cups with wafer are available if you are not comfortable with intinction. Gluten free prefilled cups are also available. If you are unable to come forward during communion, but wish to receive the elements, please stay in your seat and we'll come to you.
