Control: we all want some degree of it, at least when it comes to our own lives. We want authority and influence over decisions that will affect us. Obviously, control over our bodies, lives, and choices is a given right, a freedom we should be able to execute freely. Decisions regarding our healthcare, where we live, which job we take, and how we manage our household should also be ours to make. After all, we are the ones that will be held accountable and bear the consequences of those choices; therefore, we should have control over them.

Sometimes, though, we don't have control. Every once and a while, a curveball is thrown, and we can't stop it from hitting us. We are affected by the decisions and actions of others, unexpected expenses, health issues, the death of a spouse, the weather (remember Hurricane Ian?!), and simple inconveniences, like a delayed flight while returning home from a long trip. Outside circumstances often make our decisions for us, whether we like it or not.

Losing a sense of control can feel overwhelming and cause distress. We become anxious, because we can no longer predict the future. We may feel helpless and restricted, as if we've lost our sense of autonomy or independence. To lose a sense of control over one's life can be nerve-wracking, and even a little scary.

Our response to a loss of control, however, is completely up to us. We may be called to action, especially if lives are negatively affected or a freedom is denied by the decisions of others. Unjust

I would love to give church goers one practical step to improve their Sunday church experience. Arrive 15 minutes before the service, and stay 15 minutes after the service. In 3 weeks, these extra few minutes will change a lot about your experience. Let me give you three things that will change:

- 1. If you walk through the door of your church 15 minutes before a service, you will find the worship more impactful and your pastor more insightful than ever before. A calm heart is fertile ground. Peace! Anticipation!
- 2. In those extra minutes you will find new friends. Your experience in church will be dramatically altered if you arrive expecting friends to be there. But you can't build new friendships on the run in a rush to come or go.
- 3. You will find a place to serve. If you have time to talk with the folks who are serving, you will find out that most people really like serving, and after a few conversations, they will probably ask you to serve with them. Serving offers you the opportunity to be part of the church.

In short, if you struggle to enjoy church, be radical in a really ordinary way. Start your Sunday morning routine 15 minutes earlier, and you will find out your church is actually a pretty great place to hang around.

Here we are heading into another school year. We will be thinking of all our Joyful Noise teachers and all teachers across our county and country this 2023-2024 school year, wishing them a good school. Thank you teachers and Joyful Noise staff for all you do as Pilgrim's largest mission outreach.

We are still in a state of reconstruction and our church campus still doesn't look "together" as of yet. Since our general contractor stopped working, we have been gathering bids for a new general contractor. These companies are finishing up their bids and Council will look over them and make a final decision.

We are also consulting several attorneys, deciding the best approach to guide us through this complex issue. We have learned that there are outstanding vendors that received partial payments for goods and services; creating an even greater need to seek expert advice.

Building and Grounds Committee presented a 3-Phase Lighting Project to Council to restore our campus lights. The dark campus is unsafe for our congregation members, our Joyful Noise Staff and families, and to those outside missions that still meet on campus. Plus, the darkness is inviting to those looking for trouble who pass us from the street. Our hurricane insurance does not cover anything not physically connected to our buildings. Council and Finance Committee have discussed the different options on how to budget for these expenses. Council approved Phase 1, splitting the cost 80/20 with Joyful Noise (as the other utilities).

Here is the lighting project:

<u>Phase 1:</u> Lighting the drive. (The drive going towards Joyful Noise, including the needed repositioning of the basketball court lights.) The five lights, will be solar powered with timers. The lights will be attached to hinged, metal poles that fold down/come out of the ground during named storms.

TOTAL COST of PHASE 1: \$3437.11 + \$225/hour for the bucket/boom work

<u>Phase 2:</u> Existing light pole fixtures. This phase is to repair and replace the nine poles in the main parking areas that were damaged in the hurricane, including the acorn style fixture atop of them. This price is if nothing additional is required to put the lights on the poles.

TOTAL COST of PHASE 2: \$4,002.87. Building and Grounds is still gathering estimates for electricians.

<u>Phase 3:</u> Lighting the buildings. This phase will place lights high on the buildings (so people cannot take them down or turn lights out easily), staying lit all night, in specific areas. Other areas may just require motion-sensor lights to provide security.

TOTAL COST of PHASE 3: still gathering estimates

Most of the supplies for Phase 1 have been ordered and are onsite.

I know that we are all struggling lately, missing our normal church setting and space. It is hard on us all, especially for those that were here to see Pilgrim Church built. We all feel it and it can overwhelm us sometimes, which is understandable. But remember, church is not just the building we worship in; it is us – you and me, and we will see it open again. Pinky-promise. We are Pilgrim Strong.

If you are curious about what Council, Finance, or Mission discuss at meetings – come check them out. You all have a voice and impact on our church and its future. You all have gifts that are seen by others, but sometimes go unused; and we want to see them used! Please stop in.


