Talk is cheap ... Well, actually it's free! And if there is one thing I know for sure it's that many of us love to gab. Of course, there is the occasional introvert that tends to listen more than speak, but even they have a lot to say when they feel comfortable enough to open up. Obviously, talking can be a good thing, especially when what we say is encouraging and uplifting. Speaking a simple phrase like "great job!" or "I love you" can quickly brighten another person's day and inspire them to continue moving forward with positive energy. Talking also allows us to share important information. Humankind has been sharing useful information by talking for thousands of years! From alerting others to potential danger heading their way to sharing recipes with a neighbor, talking has been a vital form of communication. I can't begin to imagine what humankind would look like if God had not gifted us with the ability to communicate through speech.

However, sometimes we don't necessarily use our words for good. When angry, bitter, or upset, we can discharge words that are sharp, hateful, and mean, words that tear another person down instead of building them up. We all too quickly lash out at those with whom we are upset, sometimes saying things we (should) regret, and speaking ill of them to others.

Wings of Shelter works to empower and encourage clients academically, emotionally, spiritually, and socially to help them heal from the complex trauma they have endured and move toward independence. Residents of the program receive trauma-focused mental health counseling, medical care, private schooling. tutoring. opportunities to pursue hobbies, part-time jobs, and re-socialization through a volunteer big sister program.

The topic will be "Seasons of Our Lives" with an ultimate objective of identifying how we involve ourselves in service to Pilgrim Church. All women are invited!


Prayer Partners

The format is a class discussion of verse-by-verse chapters that include historical context, Old Testament references, and group insight into relevance for today. As we conclude The Acts of the Apostles, we read of the good news for all people and recount the origins of the Church and its growth—from the persecution of the followers of Jesus through the spread of the faith. We see that the mission of the Twelve has become the mission of many, as we are called to gift the world with the message of Jesus through our lives today.

In mid-September we begin a study of Corinthians.

Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians reads like a letter from a parent who wishes to share wisdom—and a warning—with his or her children. Paul has received some disturbing news about the people he knows well and loves. Therefore, this letter reflects Paul's own suffering as well as his desire to have the Corinthians change their ways. In the second letter, we catch a glimpse of the passion of Paul, a man with many moods and emotions.

As you study these letters written by Paul, the church of Corinth exemplifies the fact that arguments have always existed among the people of God. Though these arguments are familiar to the Christian journey, we are reminded in these letters that the Holy Spirit is with us and will work through us—and that our deepest call is to love God and one another.

ACTS Prayer Method

A: Adoration

Begin your prayer time adoring God. Praise God for who He is. Remind your heart of who He is. It may be helpful to write down the attributes and promises of God found in Scripture as you praise him.

Examples of Adoration in Scripture: Psalm 100:5; 34:1-9; 1 Chronicles 29:11-12

C: Confession

Admit and confess your sin to God so your prayers will not be hindered. Avoid being general about sin. As you confess over time, your confession will get more and more specific. This may lead you to confess your sin to a brother or sister in Christ as instructed in Scripture.

Examples of Confession in Scripture: Psalm 32:3-5; 1 John 1:8-9; James 5:16; Psalm 51

T: Thanksgiving

We always have reason to be thankful, even with the hard things present in our lives. As we pray, God will use our gratefulness to change our perspective. Spend time thanking God for what he has done for you in Christ and all the ways he has provided for you.

Examples of Thanksgiving in Scripture: 1 Thessalonians 5:18; Psalm 103:1-6; 9:1-2

S: Supplication

Finally, let your requests be made known to God. Let God's Word guide you in this. Authentically pour out your heart before the Lord and ask him for whatever is pressing in your life or the lives of others.

Examples of Supplication in Scripture: Philippians 4:8; John 14:13-14; 15:7; Psalm 84:11; Matthew 7:7-12
