Cathy, Charlie, and I took a day trip up to the mountains, where my senses were overwhelmed with all the aspects of fall that I find to be especially sublime: the rich colors of the changing leaves, the smell of burning oak wood drifting out of chimneys, and the crisp, cool air on my skin.



Finance Report

The time is quickly approaching when your church leadership plans the budget for next year. This is our annual 'reality check' where we objectively analyze our current financial situation to help us prepare for 2024 expenses.

The good news: we have survived two tough years (Covid) which was followed by another tough year (lan)!

The bad news: those events have wreaked havoc with both our sanity and our budget!

You can see printed in each Sunday Bulletin, we consistently fall short of our budgeted revenue. There are several reasons for this. Over these past three years we have lost membership. We don't have the capability of streaming our services on Facebook. Holding services at Kingsgate Clubhouse doesn't appeal to some. No longer having our fellowship events has reduced our visibility in the community.

Bottomline: reduced membership = reduced revenue. Unfortunately, the church's cost of doing business has dramatically increased. In the last two years, for instance, our annual Property and Casualty Insurance premium has doubled to \$80,000. It is expected to increase substantially next year also.

And, as mentioned before, the considerable cost of redoing the outside lighting and the signage in front was not covered by our insurance. Our reserves were depleted by having to spend our carefully hoarded hurricane deductible CD of over \$200,000 to take care of damage caused by lan. These are expenses we could not have anticipated. But the reality is we must find a way to cover the shortfalls.

We have all been eagerly watching the progress of rebuilding our beloved church buildings. We are all looking forward to returning to our church campus. Once we again have church services at Pilgrim, we will surely regain a feeling of normalcy that has been missing in our lives. Our church is our home, and we will return soon.

In the meantime, let us all search our hearts (and our pocketbooks!) and pray for guidance when pledging to the church. Let us all accept the challenge to give sacrificially. As Pastor Ken says, "Give until it feels good"!



ADVENT

Advent is from an old Latin phrase – ad venio, loosely translated "until the coming." It is a time for reflection during which we prepare for Christ's coming.

Christmas is itself the adaptation of an ancient ritual known as Saturnalia – a raucous and ribald occasion that celebrated the return of the light. It took place on the eve of the winter solstice – an evening that marked the sun's slow walk back from the lengthening nights. The light was returning.

When early Christian communities, who knew very little about how or when the birth of Jesus actually took place, wanted to find a fitting time to commemorate his birth, they appropriated this pagan ritual and decided the return of the light was the perfect metaphor for celebrating the coming of Jesus: Saturnalia became Christmas.


In order to prepare herself for the coming of the Christ-child, the Church asked Christ's followers to use the four weeks prior to that to examine not so much their inner being – that would come in Lent – but the outer world. As disciples called to extend the reach of God's love most fully expressed through Jesus – Advent became the occasion to assess whether or not such love was evident.

"O come, O come Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel." I could spend the entire Advent season unpacking the meaning, the intent, the call inherent in that single line.

The first two words express deeply and quite substantially the posture of the worshiper in Advent: O come. It is a posture of prayer before the Creator. It gives the worshiper in song the voice of the supplicant. That first word – but a single letter – encompasses the deep longing of a world in need of love. The second word, a verb calling for action, admits to the one who has called us into service and into mission our dawning awareness that we are incomplete. All that we see admits to the utter insufficiency of our capacity to love change into being. We need the Creator. O come.

the journey to Christmas. This study time includes short video sessions featuring the author, Rachel, guiding participants through the content. This study will be led by Pastor John.


Books to follow along with the study will be available in the Church Office for \$13 each. There is an e-book version available for those who are interested.


