From the Desk of Pastor John

What comes to mind when you hear the word “Worship”? For me, the word “worship” takes me back to Sunday mornings in the sanctuary of my childhood church. I picture the green carpet, the beautiful communion table with “do this in remembrance of me” engraved on the front, the striking pulpit in the middle of the stage, and the colorful stained glass of Jesus the Shepherd lit up behind the baptistry. I also picture the ministers and other men in their Sunday suits and the women in their Sunday best, greeting each other as they move to take their seats.

I also vividly remember the cream-colored Sunday bulletins with the Order of Worship printed in them. There were prayers, hymns, scripture readings, and a sermon. During the prayers, we all bowed our heads while the pastor prayed. When it was time to sing, we all stood and sang, or at least made a “joyful noise.” Then we’d listen to the scripture reading, followed by the sermon. All of it was meant to

draw us into the presence of God and inspire us to continue our walk with Jesus.

When I reflect upon this question and my experience with worship, it’s easy to think of worship as something that we do only on Sunday mornings, as if it’s not something that is to be a part of our everyday lives. However, Sunday morning is not the only time we are to worship. Worship is more than just singing hymns, praying, and listening to scripture and sermons. We are to live our lives with an attitude of

worship; it's what we are to be about. In other words, our aspiration should be to worship God in everything we do. We should be intentional about making sure our thoughts, words, and actions are worshipful towards God.

Worshipping God in your everyday lives is easier than you think. Worship, at its core, is honoring God. Of course, we do this when we gather on Sunday morning to sing hymns, reflect on scripture and pray. However, our actions on the other six days of the week can be worshipful as well. We worship God when we carve out time to be in the presence of God, pray a prayer of gratitude, read and reflect on scripture, or sing along to a praise song in our car.

What you might not realize, though, is that our interactions with others present us another opportunity to worship. How we treat one another reflects our attitude towards God; we either glorify God in how we respond to another person or ... we don't. When we choose to be kind and compassionate, to serve and care for another, to fellowship and be in community, and to forgive and love, we are worshipping God. When we live out these principles, not only are we being obedient to Christ's teachings, but we are choosing to honor and glorify God in our everyday lives. We are putting God's will above our own, recognizing that God is God and we are not.

Coming together to worship on Sunday mornings is important. We are called to worship in fellowship with our siblings in Christ. But worship doesn't end after the benediction. Worship is something we are to do each and everyday of our lives. We are to do it to honor, thank, and express our love for God, our Creator, whose love for us was embodied and put on full display for us in Christ Jesus.

May our worship not be limited to only one hour on Sunday mornings. In all that we do, each and every day, may we praise and worship God.

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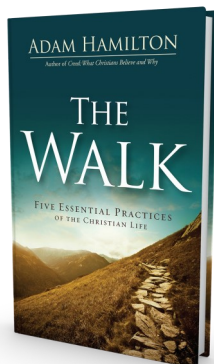


Lent - Easter

Lent Bible Study

All Pilgrims and friends are invited to Pastor John's Lent Bible Study. This year he is using a book entitled "The Walk" on Wednesdays. It's not too late to join the group at noon or 6:30 p.m. in the Conference Room.

In "The Walk", author, Adam Hamilton focuses on five spiritual practices that are rooted in Jesus' own walk with God and taught within the New Testament. Each of these practices is intended as part of our daily walk with Christ while also being an essential part of growing together in the church.



Holy Week

Our Lenten journey culminates as we experience it during Holy Week.

So much of our faith is connected to what happens in this week. We invite you to participate in each activity this week. Your experience of Easter will be so much fuller and richer when you experience all the worship opportunities of Holy Week.

Palm/Passion Sunday

Holy Week begins with a festive, and somewhat disorderly procession into Jerusalem. In lieu of a red carpet welcome, people throw their own cloaks and hastily cut palm branches into the streets to show attention to the man riding on the donkey. They shout "Hosanna!" to express their eager hope that Jesus will save them from their Roman oppressors. When he confronts the corrupt practices of the temple money changers, he only further increases the threat he poses to those in power. It won't be long before they decide the time has come, he must be silenced.

Join us at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, March 24, where like the first century crowds, we'll wave our palm branches, raise our voices in glad shouts of blessing, and sing joyful songs of praise.

Maundy Thursday

This is the night that Jesus shared a last supper with his disciples, the Son of God washed their feet, experienced betrayal and abandonment before the night was over. In this service, we celebrate communion and keep watch as we listen to the story of this night unfold. Worship is at 6:30 p.m.

Good Friday

This day we remember how God's love, made flesh in Jesus, endured the pain and violence of the crucifixion.

Easter Sunday

After the unthinkable happened, after their rabbi teacher had been so brutally executed some women get up at dawn. They go in love to properly prepare his body. The women are greeted with a startling discovery.

On Easter Sunday, we encounter the awe of that first Easter morning. Join us at 9:00 on Sunday, March 31, as the joy of Easter Sunday dawns in our lives just as the sun rises on our days.

Council Highlights

- The Community Center is starting its final stage of completion. The remaining items to be completed will be done over the next few weeks, with final cleaning and floor waxing to be done. The exterior will be done soon afterwards.
- We are finalizing the projected cost to light our campus with our contractor, 8:18 Restoration & Reconstruction along with the electrician that Pilgrim has used over the years, Phil Magill. There is no timeline as to when this project will be completed at this time. Due to the cost of items increasing and their availability, a new cost projection was needed.
- Council has moved its usual meeting time to 6:30 p.m., every fourth Tuesday of the month. Women's Fellowship

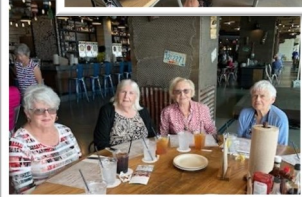

Learn and Grow

March 17 Trivia

St. Patrick's Day is one of the most globally celebrated feast days.

St. Patrick was born in the late fourth century in Roman Britain (Scotland/Wales),

Legend holds this saint drove all snakes out of Ireland, though we know there have never been snakes in Ireland.

For spreading Christianity across the island, St. Patrick's is known as the great "Apostle of Ireland."

St. Patrick was kidnapped when he was 16 by Irish raiders and enslaved in Ireland for several years. Tradition says, he spent six years in the Slemish Mountain region in Northern Ireland as a shepherd of pigs and sheep. He escaped and was a stowaway across the North Channel.

Many believe that St. Patrick used the symbol of the shamrock – the three-leaved clover – as a means of evangelization; the three leaves represent the Holy Trinity of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

St. Patrick's Breastplate is a Christian hymn whose original old Irish lyrics are traditionally attributed to Saint Patrick and his Irish ministry in the 5th century.

It is written in the style of a druidic incantation for protection on a journey. It is part of two manuscripts, the Liber Hymnorum, a collection of hymns.

Breastplate of St. Patrick

I arise today Through a mighty strength, the invocation of the Trinity,
Through a belief in the Threeness, Through confession of the
Oneness Of the Creator of creation.

I arise today Through the strength of Christ's birth and His baptism,
Through the strength of His crucifixion and His burial, Through the
strength of His resurrection and His ascension, Through the strength
of His descent for the judgment of doom.

I arise today Through the strength of the love of cherubim, In
obedience of angels, In service of archangels, In the hope of
resurrection to meet with reward, In the prayers of patriarchs, In
preachings of the apostles, In faiths of confessors, In innocence of
virgins, In deeds of righteous men.

I arise today Through the strength of heaven; Light of the sun,
Splendor of fire, Speed of lightning, Swiftmess of the wind, Depth of
the sea, Stability of the earth, Firmness of the rock.

I arise today Through God's strength to pilot me; God's might to
uphold me, God's wisdom to guide me, God's eye to look before me,
God's ear to hear me, God's word to speak for me, God's hand to
guard me, God's way to lie before me, God's shield to protect me,
God's hosts to save me From snares of the devil, From temptations
of vices, From every one who desires me ill, Afar and anear, Alone or
in a multitude.

I summon today all these powers between me and evil, Against every
cruel merciless power that opposes my body and soul, Against
incantations of false prophets, Against black laws of pagandom,
Against false laws of heretics, Against craft of idolatry, Against spells
of women and smiths and wizards, Against every knowledge that
corrupts man's body and soul.

Christ shield me today Against poison, against burning, Against
drowning, against wounding, So that reward may come to me in
abundance.

Christ with me, Christ before me, Christ behind me, Christ in me,
Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ on my right, Christ on my
left, Christ when I lie down, Christ when I sit down, Christ in the heart
of every man who thinks of me, Christ in the mouth of every man who
speaks of me, Christ in the eye that sees me, Christ in the ear that
hears me.
