Council Highlights

Council members had a Saturday "retreat", exploring what serving on Council means. Pastor John gave a presentation discussing:

- the biblical foundation of church leadership
- the responsibility of church leadership to the congregation and to the mission of the church
- and the leadership role as visionaries.

This was truly a great way for Council to come together and discuss and what being on Council and what the church means now and in the future. We all enjoyed coming together for this purpose.

Please be aware that our contractor is working on the Sanctuary. Storage containers along with a dumpster has been set in our far parking lot area to keep larger materials, machinery, and tools on site during our restoration period. As a reminder, with this restoration, there are several "hard-hat areas" being worked on. Do not enter an area under construction without authorization.

There are also several projects that will continue on campus, including a long awaited lighting project. We will have LED lighting on the outside of all buildings, illuminating areas around the buildings and sidewalks, shining out several feet. Our Properties and Grounds Committee worked hard on this project for quite some time. After many hurdles, including a strong hurricane, the foundation for this project has begun!

We are in need of congregation members to join our Finance Committee. Do you have questions about the church cash flows? Do you wonder what financial decisions are being discussed for the church? Do you want to know how much we spend weekly or monthly? These answers are discussed at our monthly meetings, every third Monday night at 6:30 p.m. in the church conference room. Property & Grounds

The Property and Grounds Committee is motivated to have an attractive and safe environment for the church.

Highlights from our Property and Grounds April 11, 2024, meeting include these projects:

- The driveway potholes have been repaired with asphalt patches.
- The five live oaks purchased have a lot of new growth on them.
- A large 4 by 4 beam with predrilled holes has been erected and set in concrete in the ground for the placement of the large composite cross which was blown over by Hurricane Ian. The large composite cross was re-erected on March 21st and bolted to the beam. Later, more concrete was added at the base of the 4X4 for stabilization against strong winds. On another day, the cross was then sanded and cleaned with bleach to make it ready for painting.

The property and grounds group will be fixing up the old shed to use to protect and store the tools and equipment needed to maintain our church and school properties. We are in need of tools and equipment for this purpose. If you have any of these items that you no longer need or use please consider donating them:

Pentecost Sunday, May 19

Pentecost means "the 50th day" and marks the end of the Easter season. Pentecost is the sudden and powerful arrival of the Holy Spirit in and around the disciples and their friends gathered together in Jerusalem.

According to the second chapter in Acts:
Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent
wind came from heaven and filled the whole
house where they were sitting. They saw what
seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and
came to rest on each of them. All of them were
filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in

other tongues as the Spirit enabled them...
Now there were staying in Jerusalem
God-fearing Jews from every nation under
heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd
came together in bewilderment, because each
one heard their own language being spoken.

Peter then boldly told the crowd about Jesus, and more than 3000 were baptized. This is the birth day of the church.

The Symbols of Pentecost

Wind

 A "driving wind" surrounded the apostles on that first Pentecost. The breath of the Holy Spirit strengthens and challenges God's people on their faith journey.

Fire

 Representing the Holy Spirit, who filled the apostles with enthusiasm, replacing their fear with the courage to go forth and share Christ's story. "Tongues of fire...came to rest on each of them."

Red

 Representing Red is used at Pentecost: the fiery tongues that descended upon the Apostles.

Water

 Representing new life and the commitment first made at the time of baptism.

Dove

 Representing the Holy Spirit that descended "like a dove" and hovered over Jesus when he was baptized. Symbol of peace.
